CALIFORNIA - A DEFEAT FOR THE BIOPLASTICS LOBBY

On 28th September Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger rejected Senate Bill 1454 proposed by Sen. de Saulnier which would have extended to almost all plastic products the already unreasonable restrictions on the labelling of oxo-biodegradable plastic bags and food & beverage containers

He said "I am concerned about the much more expansive universe of plastic products that this Bill would regulate, and the unforeseen consequences that could result from such a vast expansion."

Michael Laurier, CEO of Symphony Environmental Technologies Plc said "The tide is beginning to turn. It is time to start rolling back legislation in California which gives a commercial advantage to compostable plastics, which is not in the public interest. Biodegradation in the environment is not the same as industrial composting."

California legislators have been misled by the cornstarch lobby, into using a compostability standard (ASTM D6400) for oxo-biodegradable plastics which are not intended for composting, but are intended instead to self-destruct if they escape into the open environment. They should have specified ASTM D6954 but were persuaded to reject it.

On 31st August 2010 California lawmakers also rejected a Bill that would have been the first state-wide ban on plastic shopping bags
