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CALIFORNIA REJECTS BAN ON PLASTIC SHOPPING BAGS

On Tuesday 31st August 2010 California lawmakers rejected a bill that would have been the first state-wide ban on plastic shopping bags. The Democrat Bill, which failed on a 14-21 vote is a milestone for the plastic bag manufacturing industry globally. Symphony Environmental Technologies Plc, the specialists in degradable plastics played a pivotal role as members of both the Californian Film Extruders' Association (CFECA) and the Save the Plastic Bag Alliance. Further, Symphony's deputy chairman, Michael Stephen, had discussions earlier this year at the California State Capitol in Sacramento, to explain oxo-biodegradable plastic to legislators.

Keith Christman, managing director of the Virginia-based American Chemistry Council which includes Dow Chemical Co. and ExxonMobil Corp says the Bill would have exacerbated California's economic problems by putting 1,000 plastic bag workers out of jobs, taxing consumers for paper bags and creating a "bag police" at a time when teachers are getting furloughed. Given the state's dire economy, he says, "there are other things California can do"
